In Loving Memory

Sister Lucie Ducas, CSC (Suzanne-Therese) February 26, 1936 - May 5, 2018



Sister Lucie was born in Nashua, NH, and early on she made it known that she was destined to be a shining star at St. Louis-de-Gonzague, where she was taught by the Sisters of Holy Cross.

Sister Lucie was totally committed to faith education and loved being an advocate for those in need. Her teaching ministry spanned over 55 years. She taught in MA, NH and CT. In 1983 the Diocese of Manchester awarded her with a certificate of recognition for her dedication as an "outstanding example of professionalism and Christian Service."

Prior to her illness, she served as pastoral associate for the twining of St. Mary and St. Peter parishes. She directed a Food Pantry and Clothing distribution for the poor. She helped the people in accepting and supporting their beloved Pastor who had cancer and who died at an early age. She is remembered by all as a Woman of the Church.

She loved and was loved by many. May she rest in God's Peace.

Sister Jeannette Le Houllier, CSC (Sister Paul-Raymond) May 19, 1925 - July 25, 2018

Sister Jeannette was a native of Somersworth, NH. After experiencing her years of education with the Sisters of Holy Cross, she joined the Congregation and faithfully served for 71 years. She first taught in elementary schools and then moved to teaching High School Business.

Her experience then led her to 14 years as Secretary to the Provincial. Then, after a short stretch in the Archdiocesan Office in Anchorage, Alaska, she dedicated 20 years at Notre Dame College in Manchester, NH. Her final 12 years of service were Secretarial

Services in Thonotosassa, FL, an agency under the Sisters of Holy Cross for abused and neglected children.

May her long journey find her at peace in the embrace of her Maker.

Where We Stand...

his book entitled, <u>Rediscover Jesus</u>, ¹ Matthew Kelly writes, "Jesus' whole attitude toward children was radical." (p.63) You see, in Jesus' day, "your value as a child was based in large part on your parentage and on your ability to serve the State. (p.63) Clearly, "all children were not considered equal" (p.63) Being poor, unable to be cared for, disabled, deformed, the wrong gender, or illegitimate often led to their abandonment on dung hills where they would die. (p.63) Imagine how stunned the people were when Jesus taught that we are ALL children of God. All equal in God's eyes. Imagine their surprise



when he said, "Unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven". (Matt 18:1-3) No wonder they seemed confused when Jesus commanded, "Let the little children come to me." He lifted the children up and affirmed their dignity and that of all people for all time. It is then not surprising that "The earliest followers of Jesus became known for their radical love because they rescued these abandoned children, took them into their homes, and cared for them." (p.64)

Today, more than 2000 years later, we are witnesses to a 21st century expression of a child's value being based on his/her parentage that includes both ethnicity and socio-economic status. Those of us who recognize the extraordinarily poor, oppressed, and violent living conditions that exist in Central America can better understand how parents can risk traveling hundreds of miles in horrendous conditions to find life and safety for their children. They abandon their homes to rescue their children from being kidnapped and raised as child soldiers, to save them from rape, from slavery, and from murder, to save their childhoods and their lives. What cannot be understood is how they can be victimized again in a country such as ours, families forcibly separated, and children held hostage in an effort to deter other parents from making untold sacrifices to bring their children to a safe environment. Isn't that what Mary and Joseph did when they took flight and sought asylum in Egypt to escape Herod's slaughter of all boys in Bethlehem 2 years old and younger in his efforts to murder Jesus"? (Matt 2:13-23)

A person's dignity does not depend on them being a citizen, a migrant, or a refugee. Saving the life of someone fleeing war and poverty is an act of HUMANITY.

On June 30th, faithful to the Gospel and to the mission of Holy Cross, the Sisters and Associates once again joined their voices to the voices of those who gathered nationwide and internationally in prayer

and at local rallies to proclaim loudly that "Families Belong Together." Some 35 members gathered in Chapel at St. George Manor in prayerful support of the immigrant children and their families. This powerful and meaningful prayer experience was prepared and led by Sr. Sally Stearns, CSC. Four Sisters, including Sisters Sally Ann Howe CSC, Denise Turcotte, CSC Joann Apicelli, CSC and Mary Schneiders, OP, were able to join the rally in Manchester, NH where Sisters Sally and Denise volunteered their assistance with organizational tasks.
